

Rather than having to search for fresh water, running water from a river was invaluable.


Water for cleaning With access to water, it was easier to be hygienic.



Year 5 have been investigating the **conductivity of different materials**. They learnt that metals are conductors whereas other materials such as plastic and wood are insulators. Their next challenge was to test which metal was the best conductor for a football club who wanted the brightest floodlights possible for their stadium! They did this by setting up a circuit correctly to see which metal they would recommend. They used a number of discs made from a variety of different metals. 5ST concluded that bronze was the least conductive, closely followed by brass. They were surprised to discover that silver is more conductive than copper. Will the football club be prepared to pay for expensive silver floodlights?







